MORAVIAN CHRISTMAS MEMORIES

St. Mikulas

- In Moravia as well as in some western European countries St. Nicholas Day (Svaty Mikulas in Czech) is celebrated on December 6th. On that day, according to tradition, a man dressed in the rich and regal robes of a bishop walks through the village and questions the children on their behavior during the past year. He is accompanied by an angel carrying a bag of presents, fruit, candy and nuts and by a devil with horns and a long tail, rattling a chain.
- When these three enter the home, the children kneel and pray. St. Nicholas asks the parents if the children have been good. If so, the angel dispenses treats. However if they were naughty, the devil hands out onions, potatoes and coal. Of course all children everywhere profess to being good all year

- long and because St. Nicholas (Svaty Mikulas) always believes them, most children receive good things to eat and things to cherish.
- One delicacy is marzipan, an almond paste candy, colored and shaped to look like fruit, nuts or toys. It's a favorite present and, if not eaten, is hung on the Christmas tree as a decoration.

Oplatky (wafers)



Oplatky were shared on Christmas Eve as a prelude to dinner. These very thin wafers were inscribed with nativity scenes and other designs, and were eaten with honey. Usually the father broke off a piece, sharing it with the mother and children to denote unity within the family circle. The round, sweetened Carlsbad wafer (Karlovarske Oplatky) are enhanced with almonds, chocolate or hazelnuts. Wafers were made with a special utensil resembling long metal tongs with flat round or square jaws, often producing a decorated surface. Honey was spread on the wafers. Sometimes these were decorated with rose hips, nuts or even garlic or different herbs mixed in the dough. This was not merely for decoration, but also protected the health of the household and all the domestic animals.

Pernicky (Pernik)

Although the name pernik might refer to a soft ginger-spiced bundt cake, it is predominately used to describe traditional Czech cookies spiced with cinnamon, cloves, nutmeg, allspice, and ginger. They are usually cut out into different shapes and decorated with chocolate, yogurt, sliced almonds, candy, and sugar glaze, or simply dusted with powdered sugar.

In the Czech Republic, the cookies initially appeared in 1335, when they were mainly enjoyed as a dessert or as a thickening agent in savory sauces. Today, these crispy and fragrant cookies are appreciated for their artistic value, and the lavish decorations make them a unique, edible artwork. We will share a short YouTube video on making Pernicky at our Virtual Christmas Party on December 6 at 1:30 pm. Here is the recipe in case you want to try making them.



Pernicky (Gingerbread Cookie) Recipe Cookie ingredients

3 5/8 cups of flour

7/8 cup of powdered sugar (not regular sugar)

7 Tbsp. butter

2 eggs

2 Tbsp. honey

1 tsp baking powder

1 tsp gingerbread spice (a mixture of cinnamon, nutmeg and cloves)

Mix the above ingredients. Put the dough in a covered dish in the refrigerator or 30 minutes to let the dough rest.

Roll out the dough and use cookie cutters. Place the cut cookies on a baking pan and bake in an oven 350 degrees for 9-10 minutes. Let cookies cool. Decorate the cookies a few days or a week later if possible.

Icing ingredients (Royal Icing)

2/3 cup of sifter powdered sugar-sift at least two times 1tsp of cornstarch (optional)
Juice of 1 lemon (1Tbsp)
